Hear the Word of God

In these last days of Christmas, we continue to celebrate Jesus as the Word of God who became flesh and dwells among us, full of grace and truth. Then, when the season of Epiphany begins on January 6th, we look for God to enlighten us and teach us through the living Word of scripture. The readings each Sunday will address the questions that still reside deep within all of us: "Who, indeed, is this Messiah who we welcomed at Christmas?" "What signs should we be looking for as we seek to know where he is found in the world around us?" "Where is he calling us to serve today, and why is it important to answer that call in trust and obedience?"

The answers begin to unfold on the very first Sunday of Epiphany. We call it "Baptism of our Lord Sunday" because the scripture readings always point us to the story of Jesus' own baptism in the Jordan river. To me, it is the perfect of occasion to remember not only who Christ is, but also who we are and how we are called to live as the baptized people of God. That brings us back to the baptismal covenant we are holding up during this year of focus on the theme of "Generation 2 Generation." During Advent and Christ, we remembered the call to "live among God's faithful people." The next words in the baptismal covenant call us to "hear the Word of God and share in the Lord's supper."

If Christmas is the time to welcome God's Word made flesh, then Epiphany is the time to hear what he has to say to us and to the whole world. During Epiphany, there's a beautiful Gospel story about the time a young boy named Jesus opened the Word of God to the adults who were gathered for worship. For them, hearing the Word of God meant not only hearing the words written on a scroll, but hearing the living witness to these words from one who was standing in their midst. That fits my own experience. I can read and hear the Word of God on my own, but when I read it and hear it among God's faithful people there is a broader and richer dimension to this encounter. I remember a children's sermon I preached many years ago where the two young listeners became the proclaimers of God's Word to all of us. It was the day of Epiphany, and I was showing them a picture of children from many different races. My goal was to link it to the story of the Magi and to talk about the gift of diversity. It got turned upside down when both of them admitted that they couldn't see any differences in the children in my picture. At that point, I simply ended the children's sermon in the same way we end the reading of scripture each week: "The Word of the Lord."

A Baptismal Covenant: *To Hear the Word of God*

On Sunday, January 13 we come together as a worship community and different generations to remember the Baptism of Jesus. We aslso receive new members into the life of our congregation. When these new members affirm their faith, we also share in the same baptismal promise and are reminded to "hear the word of God and share in the Lord's Supper."

During the seasons of Advent and Christmas we found many ways to worship, pray and serve together while we continued our focus on Generation 2 Generation. The season of Epiphany and beyond will provide wonderful opportunities for us to explore together God's call to us to "live among God's faithful people." If we look at the next lines of the baptismal covenant, we see



"hear the Word of God and share in the Lord 's Supper." These words coincide with "live among God's faithful people." In my own experience I have found that it is easier to hear the gospel of Christ and share in Holy Communion when I am actively part of a community of faith. In my role of Director of Youth and Family Ministry, I especially try to pass this message on to the youth of

our congregation.

In Pastor Ruud's article he states, "If Christmas is the time to welcome God's Word made flesh, then Epiphany is the time to hear what he as to say to us and the whole world." God's Word is no longer for the people of Israel but for the Gentiles as well. (Eph. 2:6) In addition to Sunday and Wednesday evening worship, there are other ways that we can hear and experience the Word together. Fellowship takes place through bible studies, Sunday School, through devotions at committee meetings and activity and service events. In these activities questions are being asked and the Word is being explored and lived out.

Generation 2 Generation is given the gift of the Word of God. Our response is to live it out and share it with all who we encounter along the way.

SCRIPTURE CAKE

(Bake at 325° F. for 1 hour and 30 min. Makes one 10-inch tube cake.)

- 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour (1 Kings 4:22)
- 3 tsp. baking powder (*Galatians 5:9*) tsp. salt (*Leviticus 2:13*)
- 1 tsp. ground cinnamon
- tsp. ground nutmeg
- tsp. ground cloves
- tsp. ground allspice (1 Kings 10:2)
- 1 c. (2 sticks) butter, softened (Judges 5:25)
- 2 c. firmly packed brown sugar (Jeremiah 6:20)
- 2 The sp.honey (Exodus 16:31)
- 6 eggs (Luke 11:12)
- 1 (8 oz.) pkg. Pitted dates, chopped (Deuteronomy 34:3)
- 2 c. raisins (1 Samuel 30:12)
- 1 c. walnuts, chopped (Solomon 6:11)
- 1 c. milk (Judges 5:25)
- 1. Sift flour, baking powder, salt cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves and allspice onto waxed paper.
- 2. Beat butter, sugar, honey and eggs in a large bowl with electric mixer at high speed, until light and fluffy.
- 3. Sprinkle c. of the flour mixture over the fruits and nuts. Add remaining flour mixture alternately with the milk to the fluffy butter mixture, beating until smooth. Stir in fruits and nuts. Spoon into a greased and floured 10-inch tube pan.
- 4. Bake in a slow oven (325°) for 1 hour and 30 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched with fingertip.
- 5. Cool in pan on wire rack 20 minutes; loosen around edge and middle with knife; turn out on rack; cool completely. Wrap in foil or plastic. Cake slices best the next day.

Learning the Practice of Prayer: A Weekend Retreat

As part of St. Mark's Lenten emphasis on prayer, Pastor Charlie Mays will offer a weekend retreat on "Learning the Practice of Prayer" using Richard Foster's classic book, *Prayer: Finding the Hearts True Home.* During the retreat, participants will be introduced to several forms of Christian prayer through readings, discussion and practice.

The retreat is scheduled for Friday, February 8 beginning at 6 PM and concluding about 3 PM on Saturday, February 9.

Foster, a Quaker theologian and best-selling author, provides an excellent and comprehensive survey of 21 forms of Christian prayer. He groups the sections around three movements (inward, upward, and outward) which address three human needs (transformation, intimacy, and ministry). Foster presents the best thinking of various church traditions to help people feel drawn to prayer and a restored and deeper relationship with

oneself, God, and others. The book is a comprehensive, yet accessible introduction to prayer and the retreat will introduce us to the three movements that it describes. We will learn about three samples of such prayers experience them by using them during the retreat.

On the inside cover, Forster writes: "The truth of the matter is, we all

come to prayer with a tangled mass of motives--altruistic and selfish, merciful and hateful, loving and bitter. Frankly, this side of eternity we will *never* unravel the good from the bad, the pure from the impure. But what I have come to see is that God is big enough to receive us with all our mixture. We do not have to be bright, or pure, or filled with faith, or anything. That is what grace

means, and not only are we saved by grace, we live by it as well. And we pray by it."

There will be more information about details such as where to buy the book, costs, and locations, etc in next month's newsletter and bulletins. We invite you to begin now to think about this opportunity to deepen your prayer life.

A Bystander can recognize a stroke by asking four simple questions:

Ask the individual to **SMILE**

Ask the person to **TALK**, to speak a simple sentence (coherently)

Ask the person to **RAISE** both arms

Ask the person to "stick" **OUT** his or her tongue to determine if the tongue is "crooked", if it goes to one side or the other.

If the person has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

A stroke is a medical emergency. Strokes happen when blood flow to the brain stops. Within minutes, brain cells begin to die. There are two kinds of stroke. The more common kind, called ischemic stroke, is caused by a blood clot that blocks or plugs a blood vessel in the brain. The other kind, called hemorrhagic stroke, is caused by a blood vessel that breaks and bleeds into the brain. "Mini-strokes" or transient ischemic attacks (TIAs) occur when the blood supply to the brain is briefly interrupted.

Parents and Guardians

As we conclude the Christmas season, we are reminded of Joseph, the Guardian of Jesus. In my opinion, Joseph's role in the Christmas story is underemphasized.

For all of the fathers reading this article, think about Joseph's situation for a moment. Remember that Jesus was born in the stable. There were no hospitals, no epidurals, no physicians, no midwives, and no "Birthing for Dummies" books; just you, Mary and the barn animals. How much exposure and training has Joseph had to the birthing experience? My guess is none, as usually only other women were present to assist the birth mother. Fathers and others were sent to the proverbial waiting room. Oh, by the way, the child to be born will change the basic fabric of the universe. Feeling the pressure of the situation yet?

After the birth of Jesus, Joseph's role of guardian really kicks in. He is told in a dream to take Mary and newborn Jesus to Egypt. They are there for two years until Joseph is told it is safe to return home. Traveling and staying a foreign country is a tough assignment for most people. I can only image what it was like for young, newly married couple with a newborn baby. Joseph and Mary then raise Jesus, and eventually their own children, faithfully in the ways of the Jewish tradition, teaching them the occupations of carpentry and homemaking.

In reading these stories, you see how critical it was that God select an appropriate guardian for Jesus. As parents, we have that same vital responsibility to choose guardians for our own minoraged children. The legally recognized way of recording this selection is with a will.


